The exhibition is **free**.

Everyone is welcome to the exhibition.

It is suitable for all ages.

The exhibition will be relaxed. You can come and go as you like.



There will be a **staff member** who will be waiting to say hello at the box office.

They are there to assist you and answer any questions.



This is where the exhibition takes place – the McKenna Gallery.

The **gallery space** has **1** room. Here you will see the exhibition and hear sounds on a loop.



The room will be a bit dark. If you want it brighter, ask a staff member.



You'll hear sounds from the speakers all around you.




If it's too loud, just tell a staff member and they can turn it down.



You can look around the gallery more after if you want.

The door you came in is also the door to leave.

Access Information

	<p>The show will tell you what's happening through sound Audio Descriptions.</p> <p>You can listen by scanning a QR code on your phone.</p> <p>If you need an MP3 player, ask for one at the front desk.</p>
	<p>The exhibition will have open captions on videos.</p> <p>Open captions are always on.</p>
	<p>It's okay to move around and make noise.</p> <p>You can come and go and walk around as much as you want.</p>



The art makes loud sounds and the rooms are a bit dark.

If you want the sounds quieter or the lights brighter, just tell a worker.



The gallery has easy access for wheelchairs or other mobility tools. You won't find any steps if you enter from the car park's back door.

The entrance from the main road has both stairs and a ramp for access.

Inside the main hall, near the ticket booth, there's an elevator. You can also use stairs to reach the gallery floor.



Warning about the things we talk about in the Sound On pieces.

The art and discussions will talk about:

- Feeling like you belong
- Human rights
- Disability
- These topics might upset some people.



Bathrooms

There's a toilet on the same floor as the gallery and auditorium that's easy for wheelchair users to get to.
